

Janvier, fevrier, mars, avril, mai, juin, juillet, aout,


Septembre, octobre, novembre, decembre

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Is your child often late to school or regularly being picked up early?

Whilst we appreciate that in the current situation there are strict rules about when your child is well enough to be able to come to school, we are finding that there are a number of children who are missing vital learning through being late to school or often being picked up early.

This chart gives an indication of the amount of time a child misses as it builds up over the year.

Every Minute Counts!

8:50 – 8:59am	Your child has arrived in time to settle well and has the best start possible.						
9:00	am	Your child has probably arrived just after most children as the school day starts at 9:00am					
	Your child is late and has missed the beginning of the school day. Being a few minutes late often unsettles children.						
9:05am 5 minutes late a day means 3 lost days in a ye						te a day means 3 lost days in a year.
