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Snapshot of the week:

Y3 sorted the different creatures into separate columns, depending on if we thought they had a skeleton or not. If we weren't sure, we stuck it in the middle. Next we made animals from play dough. One had a spine, one didn't. We saw how many jenga blocks the animals could hold. The animals with a spine held the most which we predicted.

Y6 did the skittles experiment to represent diffusion. We explained this is what also hap-

pens in the circulatory system.



Y5 carried out an experiment to recognise that unsupported objects fall towards earth because of gravity and research the effects of gravity.

#### Y4 Trip to church:

Year 4 children went for a walk to the Rustington Methodist Church on Monday morning. Thankfully the weather cleared up in time for us not to get drenched.

The children spent the morning learning the history of the church, parts of the church and had the opportunity to ask the Revd Rosemarie Clarke a range of questions. They even got to hear her play the organ quietly and then very loudly. We all learned something we didn't know before we went.

#### Sports News:

This week there have been events for KS1 and for Year 5 and 6. Monday saw the first of the KS1 Multi Skills. With eight teams competing from the locality, we entered two teams, Year 1 and Year 2. The children took part in a variety of activities, ranging from hockey dribbling to hitting the cricket wicket.

All the children performed amazingly and the Year 1 team came 4th (fantastic result for this young team!) and the Year 2 team were the overall winners! Well done to all that took part.



This week also saw a new event to the sporting calendar, badminton. This event started with some skill based activities (serving, hitting into a target). With this being a first experience of badminton for many of the children who took part, they learnt quickly and enjoyed an afternoon of something different. Well done to those who came along.



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#### Parent Survey Feedback:

Each week we will be giving a response in the newsletter to one of the questions which was asked in the parent survey before the summer holiday.

We will always ...

- Recognise that bullying happens in every school and will always take reported incidents very seriously.
- Have an anti bullying policy which is available to our parents on the school website. This outlines steps that are taken to both prevent and deal with any issues which are reported in school including the use of appropriate sanctions.
- Keep parents of pupils involved informed and work with them as appropriate to help resolve situations.
- Create support networks in school to help pupils who may be a victim of bullying and offer restorative opportunities.
- Serious incidents are reported to the Governing Body and those of a racial or homophobic nature to the Local Authority.
- If appropriate, we will invite external agencies to visit school to offer support to families.
- To prevent bullying by educating the children through our Education 4 Safeguarding curriculum, assemblies, awareness weeks and other ways in order to raise awareness of bullying. It is also regularly highlighted through our ethos and values as well as our rules: Ready, Respectful, Safe and Kind
