## Gain and deploy the skills needed to engage purposefully with religions and worldviews

- Explore questions about belonging, meaning and truth so that they can express their own ideas and opinions in response using words, music, art or poetry
- Find out about and respond with ideas to examples of cooperation between people who are different
- Find out about questions of right and wrong and begin to express their ideas and opinions in response.
- Discuss and present their own and others' views on challenging questions about belonging, meaning, purpose and truth, applying ideas of their own thoughtfully in different forms including (e.g.) reasoning, music, art and poetry
- Consider and apply ideas about ways in which diverse communities can live together for the well-being of all, responding thoughtfully to ideas about community, values and respect
- Discuss and apply their own and others' ideas about ethical questions, including ideas about what is right and wrong and what is just and fair, and express their own ideas clearly in response

- Explore some of the ultimate questions that are raised by human life in ways that are well-informed and which invite reasoned personal responses, expressing insights that draw on a wide range of examples including the arts, media and philosophy
- Examine and evaluate issues about community cohesion and respect for all in the light of different perspectives from varied religions and worldviews
- Explore and express insights into significant moral and ethical questions posed by being human in ways that are wellinformed and which invite personal response, using reasoning which may draw on a range of examples from real life, fiction or other forms of media.
